## GET THE SKILLS FOR EMPLOYMENT RIGHT IN GEORGINA

Thank you to the Board of Directors and to our staff team for welcoming me to GTTI. We've had some exciting developments this year including launching The Quest Bus, a partnership and initiative with

Routes Connecting Communities, The Town of Georgina, The Chamber of Commerce and GTTI. Since it's launch the Quest Bus has been busy with local community programming as well as thriving charter service.

2019 has brought increased attention to skilled trades.

The Province of Ontario has stepped up their campaign to encourage young people to consider the trades with catchy slogans like "Find a career you wouldn't trade". The push for enrollment in skilled trades training comes at a time when the labour market faces unprecedented shortages of skilled workers. GTTI continues to respond to market demand by offering a variety of skills training – at every level of student learner. In 2019, GTTI successfully delivered Welding as an approved pre-apprenticeship program. Our students came from a wide cross section of our community – some with experience but no certifications and many with no experience just a desire to learn. Students were taught a variety of welds, received industry certifications that would allow them to immediately work in the field and most importantly, received on-going support, credentials and post-learning assistance. All of our welding students were offered immediate employment upon graduation!

We were delighted and honoured to partner with Habitat for Humanity in 2019. Our welding students, along with our Construction Skills, Employment Training (SET) students worked alongside staff and volunteers from Habitat to frame townhomes currently being built on Dalton Road. This project provided hands-on real time experience for the students, and gave them exposure to secondary trades with an opportunity to learn from experts in construction.

GTTI continued our programming with Senior's, delivering a variety of Seniors Mentorship programs that brought seniors and youth together to learn new skills, share experience and enjoy social time. We look forward to continuing this very important program in 2020.

GTTI continues to provide up to date, modern training to meet the labour market needs of our communities. We are grateful to our donors, and funders for your continuing support in our Mission and Vision. We look forward to continuing to serve you in 2020.

#### **GTTI Institute Committee - Carr Hatch**

The Committee continues to explore the potential of developing a Skilled Trades Training Institute in Georgina. We commissioned Deloitte to undertake a major Needs Assessment study. Completed in August of 2018, it has met with excellent acceptance by stakeholders as well as contractors, developers and various levels of Government. Our committee wishes to acknowledge and thank the Town of Georgina, and South Lake Futures for the financial support that made the study possible.

We are currently meeting with the new Provincial government of Ontario to seek their support and authorization to launch our plan. Phase one is to establish an Institute in temporary locations and prove our concept over a three- year period by training 210 students each year in 11 Trades. Based on proven success, we would than establish a permanent Institute in Georgina. Time is of the essence as we would like the school to be operational not later than 1 year after acceptance by the Provincial Government.

Special thanks to our Committee Members who have worked hard to bring this concept to life; John DeFaveri , Bil Trainor and Sharon Russell.

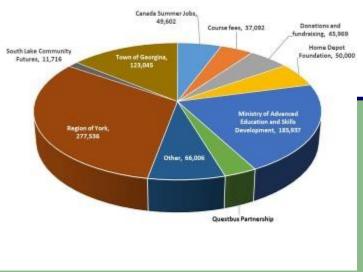

#### Revenues for 2019 (\$875,133)



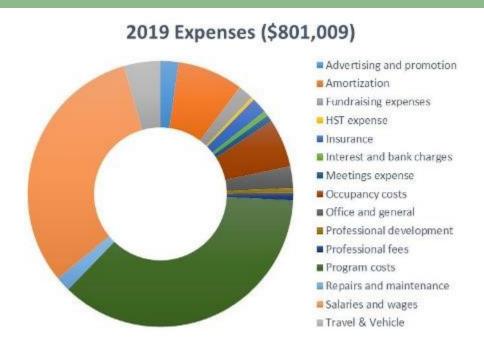

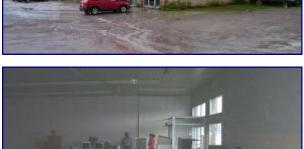






### OUR HISTORY

## What's \_\_\_ahead



The Training Centre (GTTI) has exciting opportunities in training and social inclusion for 2020, some of which will continue through 2021. GTTI is being innovative and is adapting our current programming to online opportunities to still support the community with our current funding.

Our S.E.T. (Skills, Education and Training) for Employment program has entered it's 11<sup>th</sup> year for providing career specific training, industry certifications, soft skills training and employability skills with funding through York Region's Community Investment Fund to help York Region Residents gain employment. This year the SET program has been focusing on Landscaping, Bookkeeping and Office Administration training. Students in the program receive industry certifications, soft sills training as well as hands on training reflecting the program they are participating in. All students are connected with employment services and attend various workshops to help them with their employment endeavors. We are hopeful that this program will receive approval to assist more community members in 2021.

The Ministry of Training, Colleges and Universities has approved funding for The Training Centre to facilitate a Carpentry Pre-apprenticeship program. This program will be in partnership with the Learning Centre for Georgina providing online academic upgrading to the students due to COVID-19 and in some cases, assistance in obtaining their GED or Grade 12 Diploma. Students will be completing their hands on Construction training with our in house instructor completing various projects at GTTI. We will also be partnering with Habitat for Humanity as they continue their build on Dalton street to expose the students to a variety of trades within the construction industry such as plumbing, electrical, masonry etc. Students will also receive industry certifications, soft skills training and employment support to help them secure job placements once the program was finished.

GTTI is exploring additional opportunities and partnerships to help local companies and to support entrepreneurs.

These programs and recent research projects will help to encourage and inspire The Training Centre to continue to pursue opportunities for the community and surrounding areas for brighter years to come.







## THE QUEST BUS

The 2019 year was a great year for Transportation.

We have had lots of programming on the go and an increase in charters excursions. Our 24-passenger bus was retired but we are excited to announce that we have purchased a new bus and expect to take possession of it shortly. We were fortunate to become an approved vendor with the York Region District School Board. The many schools in our community can now use our buses to transport students to extra-curricular activities.

Thanks to a 5-year grant from the Community Transportation Program of MTO, Routes, GTTI, The Town of Georgina and the Georgina Chamber of Commerce implemented a community program, called QuestBus. The QuestBus facilitates free and subsidized bus services for Georgina residents. The program aims to be self-sustainable through the sale of advertising and charter bus rentals.

We are excited to be a part of some exciting initiatives and look forward to continuing to serve our community in 2020!









#### **SERVING OUR COMMUNITY**

As a result of the grants that GTTI accesses we are able to offer many of our programs at no cost to participants. This ensures that regardless of a persons economic position they are able to access training and education in their community that will enable them to pursue their personal and career goals. Our S.E.T. program is an excellent example of a program that offers the aforementioned resources.

In the instance that a program is not funded through a grant, courses are offered at nominal rates based on GTTI's ability to deliver training in house.

#### INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT

To the Members of Georgina Trades Training Inc.

Report on the Financial Statements

#### Opinion

We have audited the financial statements of Georgina Trades Training Inc. (the Organization), which comprise the statement of financial position as at December 31, 2019, and the statements of revenues and expenditures, changes in net assets and cash flows for the year then ended, and notes to the financial statements, including a summary of significant accounting policies.

In our opinion, the accompanying financial statements present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of the Organization as at December 31, 2019, and the results of its operations and cash flows for the year then ended in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations (ASNPO).

#### Basis for Opinion

We conducted our audit in accordance with Canadian generally accepted auditing standards. Our responsibilities under those standards are further described in the Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements section of our report. We are independent of the Organization in accordance with ethical requirements that are relevant to our audit of the financial statements in Canada, and we have fulfilled our other ethical responsibilities in accordance with these requirements. We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our opinion.

Responsibilities of Management and Those Charged with Governance for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in accordance with ASNPO, and for such internal control as management determines is necessary to enable the preparation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

In preparing the financial statements, management is responsible for assessing the Organization's ability to continue as a going concern, disclosing, as applicable, matters related to going concern and using the going concern basis of accounting unless management either intends to liquidate the Organization or to cease operations, or has no realistic alternative but to do so.

Those charged with governance are responsible for overseeing the Organization's financial reporting

Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements

Our objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditor's report that includes our opinion. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance, but is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with Canadian generally accepted auditing standards will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. Misstatements can arise from fraud or error and are considered material if, individually or in the aggregate, they could reasonably be expected to influence the economic decisions of users taken on the basis of these financial statements.

As part of an audit in accordance with Canadian generally accepted auditing standards, we exercise professional judgment and maintain professional skepticism throughout the audit. We also:

- Identify and assess the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to
  fraud or error, design and perform audit procedures responsive to those risks, and obtain audit

  fraud may involve collusion, forgery, intentional omissions, misrepresentations, or the override of
  internal control.

However, future events or conditions may cause the Organization to cease to continue as a going concern.
- Evaluate the overall presentation, structure and content of the financial statements, including the disclosures, and whether the financial statements represent the underlying transactions and events in a manner that achieves fair presentation.

#### Notes to Financial Statements Year Ended December 31, 2019

#### 1. PURPOSE OF THE ORGANIZATION

On March 3, 2006, Georgina Trades Training Inc. (the "organization") a not-for-profit organization, was incorporated without share capital by letters patent pursuant to the Ontario Corporations Act, 1982. As a registered charity the organization is exempt from the payment of income tax under Section 149(1) of the Income Tax Act. and is managed by a volunteer Board of Directors. Georgina Trades Training Inc. is also prohibited from distributing any of its earnings to, or for the personal benefit of, the members or directors of the organization.

The organization operates to provide training to increase the employability of residents of the community; thereby, enhancing the economic viability of the town, the region and beyond.

Georgina Trades Training Inc. received registered charity status from the Canada Revenue Agency on June 1, 2012. This allows the organization to issue income tax deductible receipts to donors for properly qualifying gifts or donations received.

#### 2. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

#### Financial instruments policy

Financial instruments are recorded at fair value when acquired or issued and subsequently reported at cost or amortized cost, unless management has elected to carry the instruments at fair value.

Transaction costs on the acquisition, sale, or issue of financial instruments are expensed when incurred.

Financial assets are assessed for impairment on an annual basis at the end of the fiscal year if there are indicators of impairment. If there is an indicator of impairment, the organization determines if there is a significant adverse change in the expected amount of timing of future cash flows from the financial asset. If there is a significant adverse change in the expected cash flows, the carrying value of the financial asset is reduced to the highest of the present value of the expected cash flows, the amount that could be realized from selling the financial asset or the amount the organization expects to realize by exercising its right to any collateral. If events and circumstances reverse in a future period, an impairment loss will be reversed to the extent of the improvement, not exceeding the initial carrying value

#### Basis of presentation

The financial statements were prepared in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for notfor-profit organizations (ASNFPO).

#### Fund accounting

Georgina Trades Training Inc. follows the deferral method of accounting for contributions.

Revenues and expenses related to program delivery and administrative activities are reported in the Operating Fund.

The Capital Fund reports the assets, liabilities, revenues, and expenses related to Georgina Trades Training Inc.'s capital assets and building improvements campaign.

#### HST receivable

The organization qualifies as a registered charity. Accordingly, under the Canada Excise Tax Act and the Regulations it obtains a rebate of 69.69% of all Harmonized Sales Tax paid to suppliers and vendors. The unrecoverable portion is recorded as an expense with the rebate treated as a receivable.

#### Capital assets

Capital assets are stated at cost or deemed cost less accumulated amortization. Capital assets are amortized over their estimated useful lives on a declining balance basis at the following rates and methods:

The organization regularly reviews its capital assets to eliminate obsolete items.

Capital assets acquired during the year but not placed into use are not amortized until they are placed into use.

#### Revenue recognition

Georgina Trades Training Inc. follows the deferral method of accounting for contributions.

Restricted contributions are recognized as revenue in the year in which the related expenses are incurred. Unrestricted contributions are recognized as revenue when received or receivable if the amount to be received can be reasonably estimated and collection is reasonably assured.

Fees for services and courses provided are recognized as revenue in the Operating Fund when the services have been rendered and payments are assured.

#### Government grants

Government grants are recorded when there is a reasonable assurance that the organization had complied with and will continue to comply with, all the necessary conditions to obtain the grants.

#### Donated goods

A number of volunteers have donated significant amounts of their time to the organization. No amount has been reflected in the statements for these donated services because no objective basis is available to measure their value.

#### Measurement uncertainty

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with Canadian generally accepted accounting principles requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amount of assets and liabilities, disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the period. Such estimates are periodically reviewed and any adjustments necessary are reported in earnings in the period in which they become known. Actual results could differ from these estimates.

#### 5. LONG TERM DEBT

The loan payable to South Lake Community Futures Development Corporation (SLCFDC) in the amount of \$144,784 (\$104,948 in 2018) was renewed during the year on an annual renewal basis. This loan is repayable in monthly payments of interest only at a rate of 1.75% per annum and is guaranteed by the Town of Georgina; however, starting in 2019, a mandatory \$5,000 principal repayment is required annually (which had only been optional since the loan's inception.)

The loan was originally obtained in 2008 to complete renovations to the Georgina Trades Training Inc. facility.

During 2019, an additional amount of \$44,851 was obtained to bring the loan back up to the \$150,000 that had been initially loaned from Southlake Community Futures Development Corporation on June 27, 2008, per the original promissory note.

#### 6. FINANCIAL INSTRUMENTS

The organization is exposed to various risks through its financial instruments and has a comprehensive risk management framework to monitor, evaluate and manage these risks. The following analysis provides information about the organization's risk exposure and concentration as of December 31, 2019.

#### (a) Credit risk

Credit risk arises from the potential that a counter party will fail to perform its obligations. The organization is exposed to credit risk from non-payment of course fees and/or fundraising amounts. In order to reduce the risk, course fees are usually paid in advance. An allowance for doubtful accounts is established based upon factors surrounding the credit risk of specific accounts, historical trends and other information.

#### (b) Liquidity risk

Liquidity risk is the risk that an entity will encounter difficulty in meeting obligations associated with financial liabilities. The organization is exposed to this risk mainly in respect of its receipt of funds from its funders and other related sources, and accounts payable.

#### (c) Market risk

Market risk is the risk that the fair value or future cash flows of a financial instrument will fluctuate because of changes in market prices. Market risk comprises three types of risk: currency rate risk, interest rate risk and other price risk. The organization is not exposed to any of these risks.

Unless otherwise noted, it is management's opinion that the organization is not exposed to significant other price risks arising from these financial instruments.

#### Notes to Financial Statements Year Ended December 31, 2019

#### GEORGINA'S COMMUNITY CONNECTION CENTRE (THE LINK)

During 2014, a grant of \$150,000 was received from the Ontario Trillium Foundation to be used to build and equip a kitchen for a new community hub in Georgina, called Georgina's Community Connection Centre, hereinafter referred to as the "Link". The new kitchen is to host community meals, nutrition/cooking workshops and food-related training. At the end of 2014, these funds were not expended, accordingly the grant was recorded as deferred revenue in the financial statements.

During 2015, the organization carried out the improvements and purchased equipment for the Link to allow the kitchen to be fully functional. Accordingly, these costs (approximately \$150,000) were included as program costs and the Trillium grant (\$150,000) was recorded as revenue in the 2015 financial statements. Georgina Trades Training Centre Inc. agreed to take on the responsibility and assume the risks associated with the application to the Ontario Trillium Foundation, and also to take on the monitoring and reporting responsibilities of those funds, in order to obtain the kitchen and dishwashing equipment and renovation capital on behalf of the Town of Georgina. Accordingly, the equipment and renovations became the property of the Town of Georgina once they were acquired and installed. Georgina Trades Training Inc. has access to the kitchen equipment and kitchen facility, and the Town of Georgina in turn has access to the equipment and facilities for their own revenue generation and sharing through rental and community use, and for the use and access of other Link licensees. In recognition of the acquisition of \$150,000 from the Ontario Trillium Foundation by Georgina Trades Training Inc., the assumption of the monitoring and reporting responsibilities of those funds, and the provision of those proceeds to the Town of Georgina, a credit of 20% over three years was approved (\$30,000 total or \$10,000 per year).

The licence agreement was approved by Council on February 24th, 2016 and the formal signing of the agreement occurred on March 8, 2016, regarding the use of the facilities by Georgina Trades Training Inc. for program offerings. Pursuant to this licence agreement, the commencement date of the contract is March 1, 2016 for the sum of \$877.85 plus applicable taxes per month over a term of twelve months. As described above, The Town of Georgina provided a credit of \$30,000 at the commencement date of the lease (March 1, 2016). Georgina Trades Training Inc. has already utilized the credit (as at March 31, 2018) to offset facility usage payments; however, the organization is responsible for paying the applicable taxes on a monthly basis during this time.

The licence period of five years which began commencement on March 1, 2016 was terminated as of September 18, 2018. A new two year licence agreement between the Town of Georgina and Georgina Trades Training Inc. for the use of the Link kitchen for the 2019 and 2020 fiscal years was entered into with a rate of \$30.34 + HST per day for 2019 and \$30.69 + HST per day for 2020 based on usage of the kitchen for culinary training programs. Georgina Trades Training Inc. is to receive 20 free hours of shared space per year (i.e. event hall, meeting rooms) and is required to pay for space usage beyond the annual allotment.

#### 8. ECONOMIC DEPENDENCE

Georgina Trades Training Inc. is dependent on annual contributions from various levels of government to finance its general fund operations. Should these contributions cease, the organization would be unable to continue these operations.

#### CONTINGENCY - CLAIM

During the year, a passenger injured themselves getting on a bus owned by Georgina Trades Training Inc. Subsequently, a claim has been filed against the organization. The claim is still in the preliminary stages.

#### 10. SUBSEQUENT EVENT - COVID-19

Subsequent to December 31, 2019, the Covid-19 outbreak was declared a pandemic by the World Health Organization. This has resulted in the Canadian and Ontario governments enacting emergency measures to combat the spread of the virus. The situation is dynamic and the ultimate duration and magnitude of the impact on the economy and the financial effect on the organization is not known at this time. The current challenging economic climate may lead to adverse changes in cash flows, working capital levels and/or debt balances, which may also have a direct impact on the organization's operating results and financial position in the future.

At Georgina Trades Training Inc. our accomplishments would not be possible without the ongoing support of our many partners, funders, donors, and our community. We would like to thank and recognize those that have helped to make 2019 a hugely successful year for Georgina Trades Training Inc.
